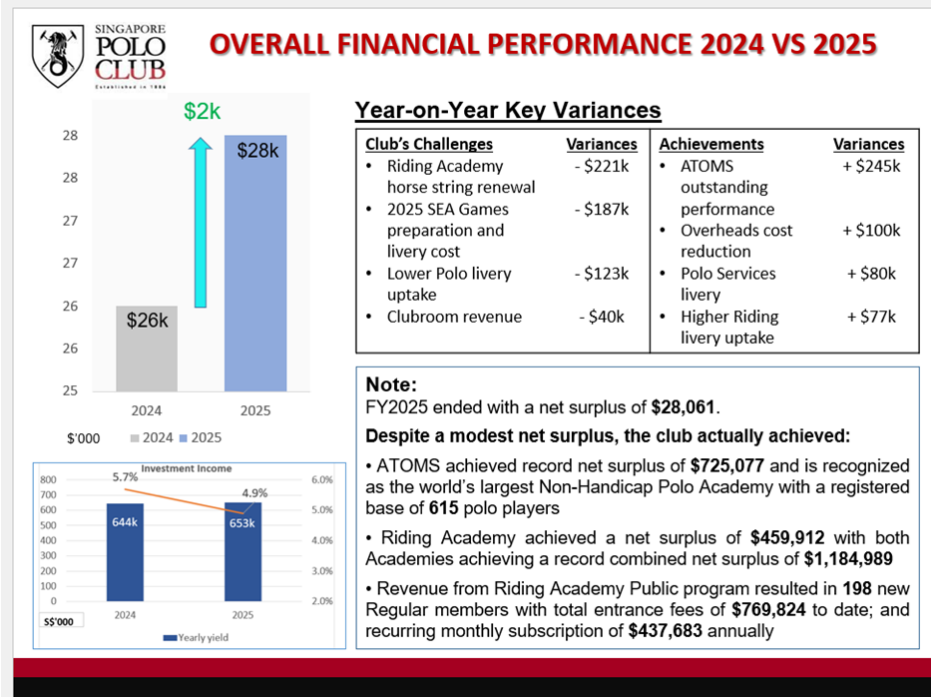


**SINGAPORE POLO CLUB

Minutes of the 79th Annual General Meeting of Members of the Club duly convened and held at the Singapore Polo Club Clubhouse, on Tuesday, 31 March 2026 at 7.00 pm

	<p>The 79th Annual General Meeting did not start at 7pm as planned due to the lack of quorum. The meeting was then adjourned for half an hour in accordance with Rule 36 (d).</p> <p>As of 7.30pm on Tuesday, 31 March 2026, the meeting had an attendance of 92 members made up of 20 CPPM, 51 Charter Members and 21 Regular Members, which formed the required numbers for a quorum as per Rule 36(d). The meeting then proceeded with a qualified quorum.</p> <p>GM then proceeded to read the Standing Order and reminded members to observe the regulations of the AGM at all times. 	<p>President, officiating as Chairman of the meeting, thanked GM and members attending the 79th Annual General Meeting.</p> <p>President also expressed his appreciation to Members, Committee and the Management for the great support extended to him and his team, without of which, the Club would not have been able to achieve many successful initiatives.</p> <p>SPC Key Challenges & Milestones Achieved FY 2025</p> <p>President addressed the meeting that the Club's land lease renewal and its long term operational and financial sustainability will very much depend on how the Club can effectively work with the relevant authorities, increase our engagement and support to the general community, grow our tourism value and create a vibrant equestrian community in the very heart of Singapore.</p> <p>He also expressed that time is a luxury and we have to work diligently and collectively as one and to also expend enough efforts to convince the relevant authorities that the Singapore Polo Club deserves to remain where we are beyond 2038.</p>	Mr Khong Kin Hoong, Lawrence (K2505)



President then proceeded to pass the microphone to Kirby Khoo, the Club's Finance Manager to present the financial performance

Kirby presented that the Club began the year with much uncertainty, exacerbated by inflation worldwide, reduced consumer spending and also impacted by the increase of US tariffs.

Despite all these tremendous uncertainties, the Club actually closed the financial year in 2025 with a modest net surplus of \$28,061, a \$120,000 favorable variance to budget.

He also added that following the closure of Jackpot in October 2023, Polo has been heavily subsidized at approximately \$1.6 Million annually and they are supported heavily by the 2 academies, the Riding Academy and Atoms Academy.

Kirby went on to present the year-on-year variance between 2024 and 2025 on the Club's challenges from the highest to the lowest, as presented in the above slide. As part of the Riding Academy's efforts on its renewal on the fleet of horses by retiring of ageing lame horses and to acquire suitable replacement horses, the horses, Brownie, Amazing Chacco and I'm Special were put up for adoption. Also, the Riding Academy had recently acquired 07 new horses in 2025.

Secondly, he presented that due to the Club's withdrawal from the SEA Games, there was actually a variance of \$187K. Lower Polo livery uptake driven by lower participation in Chukkas and tournaments, and Club rooms revenue contributed to a variance of \$123K and \$40K respectively.

Kirby is pleased to report on the key achievements. Atoms achieved a record net surplus of \$725, 077 and is recognized as the world's largest non-handicapped Polo Academy, with a registered base of 615 Polo players.

The meeting gave a round of applause for the excellent work by Atoms Academy.

Riding Academy achieved a net surplus of \$459,912 and both academies showed a record combined net surplus of \$1,184,989. Also, the revenue from the Riding Academy Public Program resulted in 198 new regular members with a total entrance fee of \$769,824 and a recurring monthly subscription of \$437,683 annually to date since the inception of the riding program.

President's Report

President addressed the meeting that when he took over the position of President in 2023, he sets the Board of Director's (BOD) model where the Committee acts like a Board and sets the Vision/Mission and strategies while the GM oversees the Club's operations as he recognizes that this is an efficient way of management.

Under this BOD model, sub-committees play an advisory role when required and should not micromanage or interfere with the operations of the Club.

President added that this model has proven to be very successful and some modifications could be made especially in the role of Polo Sub-committee where interaction with the handicap polo community could provide valuable interaction and feedback.

He went on to present that the BOD model is a proven success as evidently reflected from the following achievements:

- 1. The inaugural Annual Cosmopolitan Polo Tournament 2025** which achieved a sell-out crowd of more than 600 enjoying different levels of polo and the lifestyle that surrounds the sport. The 2nd edition of this annual series promises to be even more exciting with a mega after party.

- 2. Atoms Polo Academy**, headed by the GM, is recognized as probably the world's largest non-handicap polo academy and has grown to a base of 615 players. It is the single largest feed to our pool of handicap polo players contributing to about 30% new players to the Club's list of handicap polo players. Atoms achieved a record net surplus of \$725,077 in FY 2025.

The Atoms Polo League goes into its 4th successful year with record participation for the junior and senior Atoms League. An honour board was specially created for this exciting event.

3. The SPC Riding Academy, headed by our GM, has achieved a record annual average surplus of \$586,820 from FY 2021 to FY 2025 and also remains one of the key pillars of revenue for the Club.

The **Riding Academy's public riding scheme** has contributed about 200 new SPC Regular members to the Club and total entrance fees income of \$769,824 and an annual recurring subscription income of \$437,683.

4. Polo and Riding experience packages were created and tailor-made to meet the expectations of corporations and groups. These will be made available to travel agencies and hotels to boost our tourism value

5. The Growth in Lifestyle events like Christmas Light up, Lo Hei Night, Songkran, Music & the Arts is a strategy to retain, keep happy and expand the Club's membership base. A record 350 members turned up for the Christmas Light up and about 180 members turned up for the Club's Lo Hei Night.

6. The Handicap Polo League in April 2026 played on a full field; will add more excitement and fun to Polo. A combination of the best of Atoms will team up with the Club's handicap polo players to create a first ever of its kind League that will be played over 2 seasons in a year.

This transition will see our polo players sharing their experiences and skills on the polo field with the best of Atoms. Each team will have a larger player base to ensure that at any one time, there will be enough players for the matches.

7. Polo Tournaments & Events

8. The Club is reaching out to community clubs, SAFRA and Police Home Team Clubs to offer riding and polo experiences to positively engage the community and to positively raise the Club's profile as an integral part of the community.

President then went on to update that one of the key successes of the BOD model is the effective growth of its beneficiaries.

The Club has upped the level of support to the equestrian community by supporting their events, cash donations, marketing & communications support, Stables management programs, polo & riding experiences for their beneficiaries, free use of the Club's meeting rooms and more.

A good case in point was the organization of a Pony Club of Singapore Day with Ms Peggy Yeo, where we provided polo/riding experiences as well as a membership drive.

The Club also designed the POS membership cards and membership application forms and supports certain equestrian competitions for BTSC and EFS with a FEI recognized attending vet with no charge, to ensure it's relevance to the equestrian community.

The SPC Annual Outreach Polo Tournament & Carnival series 2023, 2024 and 2025.

He is pleased to report that the Club's Annual Outreach event has achieved record attendances with each series with its 2025 event achieving a record attendance of almost 4,000 attendees. To date the Club has raised about \$106,656 for the various beneficiaries.

President also highlighted the importance of engaging the relevant government agencies at the highest levels as it is crucial to make them understand the value of the Club's contribution to the Community and Nation.

He added that as he is ending his term as President, he is standing for the position of Honorary Secretary so that he can continue to engage the authorities at the highest level so that the Club will stand a chance to remain where we are and is confident to contribute positively for the benefit of the Club and its members.

He would like to thank his committee members, sub-committees, the GM for the excellent work and his team of staff and all members for their great support during his term as President.

He said that he is standing as Honorary Secretary and Polo Captain's Satinder Garcha is standing as President as it was critical that the Club has no time to waste in securing our land lease extension with the key ministries.

President then proceeded to recognized the positive achievements made by Polo Captain, Satinder Garcha, who during his tenure as the past President made the bold moves to introduce investment of the Club's reserves, the expansion of Polo, proposed the BOD model, approved creation of a Polo Academy which had grown to the Atoms today, etc.

Mr Kevin Wilkinson (W0088) raised a point of order stating that as a matter of process, the President should already start to appoint two scrutineers for the voting process.

Mr Stijn Welkers (W0049) and John Berven (B0158) were appointed.

Mr Ian Lander (L1348) raised a point of order;

He noted that the President was promoting two nominees for election to the Committee. He would like to hear if there were any others who wish to promote their nominees, otherwise it could be perceived as one sided to him.

Mr Rickard Hogberg (H0080) addressed the meeting that he is also standing for President in this AGM.

He also clarified that when he was the President in 2016, this BOD model was already in place and was glad to know that the model was working very effectively. Mr Hogberg (H0080) acknowledged that the GM has done a very good job in the Club and also thanked the members for their support and contributions in one way or another.

He added that he was standing for election as President as he was concerned that the Committee might not have spent enough time discussing with regards to the strategic directives for the Club and that he would like to see more robust discussions during Committee meetings, as there were only 04 meetings held to-date since last year. Also, one of the areas he would focus on is to have a more consultative approach with members, which will see the organization of Townhalls where members can share their concerns.

Mrs Stephanie Masefield (M2347) addressed the meeting and clarified that she was the President of the Club from 2020 to 2023. She introduced her candidacy as Honorary Secretary as she believed that this is a working role with real responsibility under the Club's constitution. The Honorary Secretary is responsible for the general management of the Club, the enforcement of the Constitution and Bye-laws. Also, this role sits at the centre of coordination between management and the Committee, ensuring Committee decisions are properly carried through. It requires a regular presence on the ground, engagement and a clear understanding of the Club's day to day operations.

During her last two years as the Honorary Secretary of the Club, she has remained present, accessible and fully engaged, including stepping in to support in Polo matters when required. She said this role is about showing up, doing the work and being accountable and asked for the support to continue serving as Honorary Secretary.

Mr Satinder Garcha (G0021) addressed the meeting that in addition to what the President had earlier mentioned, the BOD model was decided a few years ago where the Committee acts like a Board of Directors and leave it to the GM, who is actually like the CEO, running the show.

The Committee does not run the show on a day-to-day basis, rather it will decide and advise on the overall strategy, leaving the GM to be accountable for the deliverables.

He also briefly touched on the importance of Outreach and Community, as it was integral with the extension of our land lease. It was key that we are inclusive and with the success of Atoms, it would lend value to the relevant ministries.

With that, Mr Satinder Garcha (G0021) proceeded to introduce Mr Asad Jumabhoy (J1485) who he has nominated as Polo Captain. He is confident that Mr Asad Jumabhoy (J1485) with his extensive background in Polo is the best candidate for this position.

Mr Asad Jumabhoy (J1485) gave a brief introduction of himself and how he was introduced to Polo. He has a long affinity with playing Polo when he started playing at the age of twelve.

Mr Asad Jumabhoy (J1485) expressed his intention to further and make Polo more inclusive, to enhance its value to the nation, with the aim of strengthening the Club's position in securing a land lease extension. He also added that he is looking forward to contributing and serving the Club.

Mr Tan Khee Nguang Terence (T0004) raised a point of order. With all due respect to the President and all the Committee members, thanking them for their speeches, he would like to request to bring the meeting back to order.

Mr Tan Khee Nguang Terence (T0004) would like to make one important point to express his appreciation to the Committee and also to all the Management and staff for achieving an incredible year, and could even achieve a modest surplus despite the challenging economic headwinds.

President then declared the ballot boxes open at 8.10pm.

Mr Ian Lander (L1348) raised a point of order. He expressed that while it may be in order to open the ballot boxes, the first item of the AGM is to confirm the meeting minutes of the 78th AGM and it might cause disruptions to the normal business of the meeting.

He also raised another point of order that if the ballot box for voting on resolution is open, it should be considered invalid because this meeting is an adjourned one and no vote on any resolution can be made that alters the rules at an adjourned meeting.

Dr Namazie (N0012) raised a point of order. He said that in accordance to the Club's Constitution on the adjournment of General Meetings, no business shall be transacted other than the business that was unfinished at the meeting from which the adjournment took place and provided further that the members present shall have no power to alter,

repeal or make additions to any of the existing rules except if a full quorum is present.

Hence, he is of the view that the issue is whether a full quorum is present now, not whether the meeting has been adjourned.

GM then informed Mr Ian Lander (L1348) that because there was a quorum present, then the ballot box for the resolution could be open for vote, of which Mr Ian Lander accepted.

Mr Ian Lander (L1348) raised a point of order. He expressed that he had a query with regards to the meeting minutes of the 78th AGM last year and that the point of order for this meeting is that any written request(s) would be answered at this AGM.

While he acknowledged that the Honorary Secretary had very diligently responded to his 04 written requests ahead of this meeting, the purpose of him writing was for his questions and the Club's answers could be heard by the general membership.

He raised the first point that he observed what was attributed to him in the minutes was that he had repeated his points, and he noted that there was no opportunity to call or correct the minutes.

Mr Ian Lander (L1348) then raised his second question, which was the hotel licence.

He queried as to how the Committee could have applied for a hotel licence without first announcing it to the general membership. His view was that the Club was not empowered under the Constitution to run a hotel and he was confident that URA would not provide its permit due to the zoning requirements. The response provided to him then was the Club would not pursue this at that point of time. However, Mr Ian Lander (L1348) was of the view that the correct approach would be to drop the project altogether.

GM clarified that the Club had indeed applied for a hotel licence from SLA and they have provided a provisional in-principle approval subject to SPC paying a GFA on the rooms, of which Mr Ian Lander (L1348) corrected and said SLA does not provide approval but rather they provide consent.

Mr Ian Lander (L1348) then sought clarification if the Club had sought consent from SLA or did the Club apply for the licence, of which Han Peck Hoe, the facilities manager confirmed that although we had applied for a licence from Hotel Licensing Board, the whole application is subject to SLA's approval.

Mr Ian Lander (L1348) then added that in view of the Club's constitution that because this is a private club for members and guests, this is one major factor for consideration.

GM further updated that as the novelty of the Club's club rooms took a dive, Management then decided to do this preliminary exercise to go through the application first.

GM assured Mr Ian Lander (L1348) that he and his team were well aware that if the Club decides to proceed with this initiative, it would require a general meeting approval. He further assured Mr Ian Lander (L1348) that the correct process, including obtaining all the relevant approvals and making sure that the project stays within the boundaries of the Constitution would strictly be adhered to.

Mr Ian Lander (L1348) also raised his concern about how was it that the Club could announce its plan for a SPC Public Polo & Riding Centre, when this is a private Club and is not open to the public according to the Constitution.

GM clarified that it was a preliminary concept which was presented to the Chief Executives of Housing Development Board (HDB), Urban Redevelopment Authority (URA), and the Ministry of National Development in 2022.

GM also added that it was only a presentation to the relevant ministries which showcased the variables of a possible collaboration engagement with the wider community. However, there was no concrete discussion or agreement made whatsoever following this meeting.

Mr Ian Lander (L1348) next raised another point of order. He said that the President's Report in the 2025 Annual Report asserts that "The Riding Academy and Atoms Polo Academy now collectively surpass 1,650 members." and that "This number surpasses the total number of SPC Members."

He said that based on the total number of members of which none of the Patrons, Honorary Life, Honorary, Charter Polo Playing, Charter Corporate, Regular Corporate, Absent (Charter Polo Playing) and Absent (Charter Corporate) members (being 62 in number) could be included in the Riding Academy and Atoms Polo Academy, and therefore, the remaining total number of members is 1,248 from which to draw the number in excess of 1,650 members.

Hence, he raised his query as to how there can be in excess of 1,650 Riding Academy and Atoms Polo Academy members out of a total membership of 1,310?

GM clarified that the figure of 1,650 includes potential new members arising from the three-month non-member trial programs conducted by both the Riding Academy and Atoms Polo Academy. After the 3-month program, they are welcome to purchase a regular membership with the Club. This initiative was conceived as a solution to increase the Club's revenue and membership, along with the vibrant engagement with the wider community base, given that the base of Polo handicap players was getting smaller.

	<p>These participants are members from both the academies, but are included in the figure as part of the Club's broader membership base. The classification was adopted solely for ease of presentation and computation in the report.</p> <p>Mr Ian Lander (L1348) said that from the way he read the report, it could come across as misleading.</p> <p>He then raised his point of order that the Board of Directors model (BOD) is not substantive because the Constitution stipulates that the Club shall be managed by a Committee and the General Manager (GM) shall work under the direction of the Committee. Hence, he does not see the purpose in renaming the Committee and breaching the Constitution by doing so.</p> <p>GM clarified that the President and the Committee's intent was more like a Board of Directors rather than a Board of Directors.</p>
